Choose from the following courses: Eng 220, 221, 222, 223, 224, 225, or Eng 226 6 6 hrs modern/ancient language Successfully complete at least 6 hours at the 200 level or above in one modern or ancient language. 200 +6 hrs history 6 Complete 6 hours in History (HST) course work with a passing grade. 3 hrs humanities 3 Successfully complete 3 hours in one of the following areas: African American Studies; classical civilization; Gender Studies 103, 201, 333, 311, 390; philosophy; religion; or Southern Studies 101, 102. 6 hrs social science 6 Successfully complete 6 semester hours in anthropology, economics, JOUR 101, political science, psychology or sociology. Complete 3 hours in the area of fine or performing arts. Choose from art history, music, dance, and theatre arts. 3 3 hrs fine arts Studio and workshop courses cannot be used to satisfy this requirement. Acceptable freshman or sophommorelevel courses are: AH 101, AH 102, AH 201, AH 202; Music 101, Music 102, Music 103, Music 104, Music 105; Dance 200; and Theatre 201. 3 hrs math 100+ 3 Successfully complete 3 hours of Math at the 100 level or above except for Math 245 and Math 246. 9-12 hrs science 9 Complete a full year of science course work in one subject area (6-8 hrs) and complete 3 credit hours in a subject area from another department. Courses may be chosen from the departments of Biology, Chemistry and Biochemistry, Geology and Geological Engineering, or Physics and Astronomy. 2 associated science labs 2 Successfully complete at least two science laboratory courses.
